Louis Public School District's 2022-2023 Community Partner of the Year!

I am so grateful to the amazing GGO staff and volunteers whose hard work made this and many more accomplishments possible. From fall hiking trips to overnight spring camping trips and every classroom lesson in between, the 2022-2023 school year was filled with smiles and scientific inquiry!

In Chicago, GGO continued partnering with Fiske and Drake Elementary Schools – with plans of further expansions within the schools for the 2023-2024 year. 

FAVORITE LESSONS

Some of GGO scholars' favorite lessons during the 22-23 school year include but are not limited to...

Recycling and Paper Making 5th grade

GGO Scholars transformed their classrooms into sustainable paper mills while gaining an understanding of the recycling process and its benefits. In an activity showing scholars how they can contribute to recycling and reusing materials that they may have once deemed trash, scholars created homemade paper from some of their own recycled waste.

Mental and Physical Health 4th grade

In this healthy movement and mindfulness lesson, scholars learned the importance of taking care of their mental and physical health as they completed a yoga flow. Through this activity, scholars regulated their breathing and engaged in yoga poses that incorporated

PLANTING POLLINATOR GARDENS

Thanks to grants from the Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation, GGO was able to install 2, 1000+ square foot native pollinator gardens at John Fiske Elementary School and John B Drake Elementary School. During the second semester, GGO taught in-class lessons on the importance of pollinators to our ecosystems. In May, GGO scholars, staff and volunteers prepared the site, planted 319 plants from 12 species, laid mulch and placed stepping stones to create beautiful, productive and environmentally important gardens!

Leave No Trace 4th grade


During this lesson, scholars were able to learn about the 7 principles of Leave No Trace. They took the principles into their own hands by creating skits for each principle with props they designed! St. Louis scholars brainstormed how they would incorporate these principles into their camping trips at the end of the year and were thrilled when they were able to put them into practice at Camp Manitowa!

Constructing a Hydroponics System 6th grade

Scholars utilized their engineering skills to create a hydroponics system for their classroom. Throughout the process of building the system, scholars discovered the benefits of using a hydroponics system. These include growing fresh produce while using minimal space and water, which is particularly beneficial in urban areas such as where the scholars live.


GGO INCREASES STEAM

GGO scholars increase their STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) comprehension through small group lessons led by university mentors, augmented by nature-based outings & overnight trips, with year-round mentorship provided by university students. Scholars engage with weekly experiential and investigative learning in small groups with rigorous and fun lessons designed to match national science standards.

A highlight was the engineering lesson and activity where scholars completed engineering related projects. The scholars were enthusiastic about creating a circuit to light up lightbulbs, heating tinfoil through batteries and using momentum to push objects off of a table. Additionally, the scholars built solar ovens and watched the thermometer jump from 75 degrees to over 120 degrees in their ovens, creating a fun competition to see which group had the hottest oven. Many scholars indicated that they had a higher interest in pursuing engineering careers after completing the activities.

OUTDOOR ADVENTURE



GGO provides free monthly outdoor field trips to solidify in-classroom lessons, enabling scholars to develop relationships with fellow classmates and mentors at no cost to the

organization's greatest critics are the scholars. One of the scholars' favorite lessons throughout the year was the 4th and 5th grade nutrition and healthy lifestyles lesson. During this lesson, scholars tasted organic produce snacks like cucumbers with hummus - many for the first time. Scholars then picked their favorite vegetables to plant and take home. This lesson - in partnership with SEED St. Louis - would not have been possible without the challenge of creating an in-classroom field trip experience. CAMPING TRIPS

GGO was able to reimplement full overnight camping trips with GGO Scholars in both St. Louis and Chicago during spring 2023! In April and May, GGO scholars in St. Louis traveled to Camp Manitowa in Benton, IL and scholars in Chicago traveled to Camp Sullivan in Oak Forest, IL. At both sites, scholars were able to partake in 24-hours of fun outdoor activities, including hiking, making arts & crafts, fire building, s'mores making, rock wall climbing, canoeing and more!

In May 2023, GGO staff and community partners brought 15 interactive booths to John Fiske Elementary School for a full day of STEAM fun! Scholars were able to wander from booth to booth, completing fun environmental, art and science activities. Some favorites of the day were vegetable pickling with UChicago's Phoenix Farm, planting four trees with Morton Arboretum's Chicago Region Trees Initiative and creating solar-powered s'mores cooking ovens out of recycled materials!
